## Peninsula Diary Mayo Hayes O'Donnell

November 30, 1949

The Tragedy of war has a brought a delightful family to Monterey to make their home. Mrs. Anita Spitzer and her tow children, Claude, age nine, and Michele, who is seven, arrived a week or so ago to remain here with her aunt, Mrs. Bertha Dulout. The little family sailed from France on October 24 and after a few days visit in Washington D. C., they proceeded on their western journey

Mrs. Spitzer is the widow of Antone Spitzer who was an accomplished pianist and a native of Vienna, where he performed before going to France. When the World War broke out, Mr. Spitzer was interned for more than eight months, after which he was allowed to join the French working army. But on May 30<sup>th</sup>, 1944, because of his Jewish ancestry, he was again taken from his family and finally disappeared in Auschwitz the horror prison in Poland.

Mrs. Spitzer, although born in Germany, is a citizen of France. She received her bachelor's degree in German and Hungarian languages at the college in Budapest and her teaching degree in French at the Sorbonne in Paris. She spent one year in England where she became proficient in the English language.

When the war was over and UNESCO opened headquarters in Paris, Mrs. Spitzer became a member of the organization's library staff in the department of subject heading and card division, working under the direction of Miss Dorothy Norberg of the Library of Congress, loaned to UNESCO to set up the library. Mrs. Spitzer left her position, after more than two years' service, on September 1 to prepare for her departure from France.

Claude and Michele do not speak English, but already they have enrolled in the Bay View school and are enjoying the new experiences in this, their adopted home. Mrs. Spitzer thinks that the greatest joy she has experience here is the view of the trees and the bay which she is privileged to see from the windows of the cottage which Mrs. Dulot has built for her niece and her children at the rear of her property on Lottie Street in New Monterey.
