### **'Our Thanks'**

We are most happy to print this letter today from Kevin D. Harty, stationed aboard the USS Regulus now at San Francisco, to the Monterey History and Art Assn.

"Permit me to express my thanks and those of my shipmates for your efforts on our behalf during our recent visit to Monterey. I can assure you that all present had an enjoyable, stimulating time at the reception which you co-hosted, and it has served an important purpose in cementing civil and military relations.

"Your effort and those of other Monterey organizations are significant steps toward better civic appreciation of our national history. You may be assured that they have not been in vain and that the historical interest engendered will be further propagated because of our recent visit to Monterey."

Another letter of appreciation to the Monterey History and Art Assn. came from the Monterey Peninsula Board of Realtors, signed by Manly P. Douglass, president:

"As part of the entertainment for the California Real Estate Association Directors' meeting in Monterey, the local board conducted a tour on Saturday, June 27th, through some of Monterey's historic buildings.

"We collected a small donation from each visitor, and, herewith, enclose a check for \$77.25, a total contribution, as a gift for your organization.

"This gift is a token of appreciation for the effort the Monterey History and Art Assn. has made in the preservation and restoration of these historic buildings and their contents."
