## **Cave Concert**

We give you today some "high-lights" or "by-lines" from the Island of Mallorca as written by Mrs. W. C. Aldous of Carmel, who, with Mr. Aldous, is traveling in Europe. At present they are in Palma and have visited Petra, the birthplace of Father Junipero Serra.

Mr. and Mrs. Aldous visited and had luncheon at the Formentor Hotel, said by many writers to be the most beautiful spot in the world. Mr. Fielding, the dean of travel writers, has his home there. At that time Charles Chaplin, his wife and their numerous children were guests. Also, the Royal Prince and Princess of Belgium were there on their honeymoon. The Peninsula travelers were in Brussels the day of the wedding and enjoyed seeing visiting guests and nobility collect in the lobby before their automobile procession to the cathedral.

"Our visit to the Dragon Caves at Cristo Porto was a never to be forgotten experience," Mrs. Aldous writes. "Said to be the largest and most beautiful caves in the world, it is a popular attraction. Only 800 others were expected to make the trip that afternoon. At the lowest level is a crystal clear lake. At the end of the tour, as though, we were seated in a theater, the lighting which rivals Hollywood's movie sets, is turned off and three electrically lighted gondolas appear carrying musicians. As they float in, around and back, we were given the most beautiful concert of classicals. One could have heard a pin drop - it was so spell binding. Then we were taken across the lake in gondolas to climb the steps taking us to the surface again."

At luncheon in the hotel there, Mrs. Aldous reported, was Adlai Stevenson with his son and daughter-in-law and the ex-Sen. Benton family. Sen. Benton was the host for an extended cruise by yacht to the Balearic Islands before going on to other interesting places in this old, old world of southern Europe.

The traveler also wrote that Spain has a strong "buy Spanish" policy. For instance, no one, for their personal use (not commercial which brings money in) may purchase any make of car but Spanish. Fruits, vegetables and meats are all Spanish, to say nothing of almost all the wines and brandies. Bourbon and Scotch is so rare and so highly taxed that it is over three

American dollars per drink. Their wines and brandies are excellent, the price of so-cheap- Spanish champagne is very good, just under a dollar per full quart.
